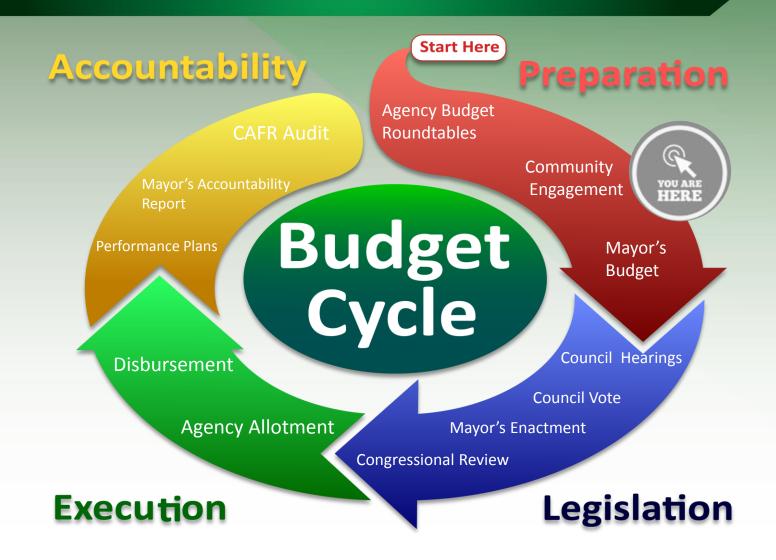

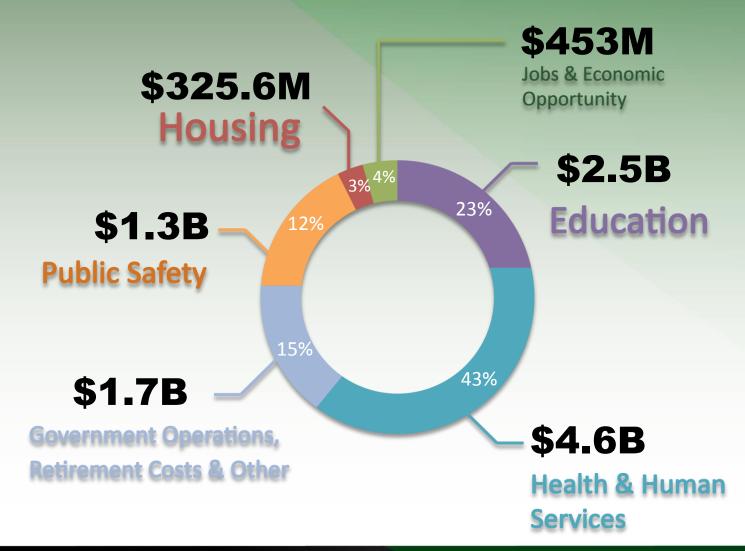

DC BUDGET FUNDAMENTALS

The District's budget is unique. It acts like a state, county, city and school district budget -- all in one. \$13.9 B \$10 billion local funds (including special Operating budget – purpose/Enterprise) programs and \$3.9 billion services Federal grants and \$1.3 B Medicaid Capital budget \$1.3 billion Capital budget

- Further achievements in Education

EDUCATION

Education

- \$174M in our teachers for retroactive salary increases and a new contract for the first time in 5 years
- \$1M in field trips for children to go to arts exhibitions and performances
- \$6.2M for out of school time programming
- \$1.6B for education services to 91,000 traditional and charter public school students

- \$78M for programs and services at UDC and the Community College
- \$38.9M for parks and recreation programming, including summer and out of school programs
- \$154M in spending for early learning
- \$38.4M for library services, materials, and programs at our 26 libraries



HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES



- **\$10.3M** for TANF policy at DHS
- \$12M+ invested in programs that divert young people from the criminal justice system
- \$1M for the Joyful Food Markets initiative at DOH
- \$3M to continue preventative adaptations for seniors with Safe at Home
- \$130M to close DC General and make homeless rare brief and non-recurring

PUBLIC SAFETY



- **\$8.9M** to help recruit and retain police officers
- **\$4.9M** to hire 48 dual-role firefighter/EMTs
- **\$4.5M** to hire 50 correctional officers and 21 social workers in the DC Jail
- **\$2.3M** to launch a Returning Citizens Portal
- **\$1.4M** to hire 28 LEAP participants to be 311 call-takers

- \$1M for a new Nurse Triage initiative
- \$1.5M towards creation of the Office of Neighborhood Safety and Engagement to engage young people most at risk
- \$500K for the Private Security Camera Rebate Program
- \$21.5M in capital investments for first responder emergency vehicles and apparatus, like ladder trucks and ambulances





- **\$100M** for the Housing Production Trust Fund
- **\$10M** for the Housing Preservation Fund
- **\$3.5M** to ensure tenants' rights are upheld
- **\$17.2M** to support DC's vibrant cultural economy
- \$15.3M to help low and moderate income families afford a down payment for their first home



JOBS AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

Jobs & Economic Opportunity

- **\$2.5M** for entrepreneurs on starting new, job-creating businesses in the District
- \$18.6M for the Mayor Marion S. Barry Summer Youth Employment Program, which provides constructive and gainful employment for youth during summer break
- \$10.2M for job training programs targeting residents with barriers to employment, including Project Empowerment
- \$1.8M in apprenticeship programs to provide pathways to the middle class, including Career Connections, LEAP



GOVERNMENT OPERATIONS



- \$3.7M for snow removal
- \$952K to support the Statehood Public Education Campaign
- \$1.5M to support additional FTEs for Solid Waste Management
- \$300K to support OpenGov Initiatives
